more flexible than ever to ensure that we can switch people across provision as their employment status changes.

 Of course we will continue to find ways of trying to help every single learner reach their full potential. To help with this we are working hard to introduce better, slicker tools to ensure we are really on top of retention and achievement and that every learner is placed on the right programme.

 And finally we will be working hard to achieve the Training Quality Standard to ensure that we can remain leading-edge in

Personal Emergency Evacuation Plans (PEEPs)

What are PEEPs?

The Personal Emergency Evacuation Plan is completed for anyone requiring assistance in an emergency evacuation to detail the correct assistance required. It enables Line Managers / Lecturers to ensure the assistance is available as and when required.

Why should a PEEP be completed?

All staff, learners and visitors to the College requiring assistance in evacuation from the building in the event of an emergency are required to have a PEEP completed to ensure a safe evacuation.

Who completes the PEEP form?


PEEPs are prepared by Line Managers in consultation with the individual staff member, to take account of all areas occupied during the work activity.

Learner PEEPs are prepared by Lecturers in conjunction with the individual learner, support staff (where relevant), Student Services and the area PAM. This should take into account all areas occupied during their working activity. A copy of the PEEP should be available in all relevant registers.

Visitor PEEPs will be generic and will primarily devolve around all members of staff regardless of their position, giving such assistance as may be identified.

RESPECT Week: 12 to 16 January 2009

The College's core message of 'valuing diversity and promoting equality' was strengthened by the RESPECT Week activities.

A Diversity Fair was held at each campus, where agencies including Action Deafness, VISTA, LGTB Centre, LASS, Refugee Action, Shama Women's Centre, Savera, Adhar, Council of Faiths, St. Philips Centre, LeicestHERday Trust and Leicester City Council provided stalls and exhibitions to promote the services they offer to the diverse communities of Leicester. The agencies also provided workshops for learners on a range of issues and subjects. Feedback was positive and many learners appreciated the opportunity to discover how the integration of diverse groups into mainstream society is supported. The School Development Support Agency also ran a workshop on community cohesion and asked for learners' views on the range of issues involved, which they are going to write up and provide us with a very useful benchmark.

A key aim of the week was also for learners to mix with those from other curriculum areas, so it

was really good that joint sessions were held, for example, a session on refugee issues for Continuing Studies and Hair and Beauty learners. We hope that more curriculum areas will plan to do this sort of "twinning" activity next year.

The highlight of the week was a gospel choir workshop facilitated by British Gospel Arts, who worked with learners from the National Diploma in Dance, Music and Sound. The morning finished with a performance in APC's Atrium.

RESPECT Week provided the College with an opportunity to build upon its links with the local community and empower our learners and staff to improve their

understanding and respect for diversity.

Sustainability

People and Planet at Regional Climate Change Conference

"Adaptation 2009" was a one-day regional conference held in Leicester on adapting to climate change. The objective was to help equip organisations to address climate change adaptation at a local level, and to help meet the requirements of the Nottingham Declaration and the new Local Area Agreement indicator 188. The conference included the launch of the East Midlands' Regional Programme of Action on Climate Change.

The event consisted of key note speeches and presentations, drama, workshops and displays. Leicester College was represented by members of the College People and Planet Group.

Bid success for new technologies

The College has been successful in a group bid to the FE Knowledge and Technology Transfer (FEKTT) Pathfinder project. This project has been set up by DIUS "to unlock the talent of the FE workforce to deliver business innovation through knowledge transfer". There are only five national winners out of a total of 133 bids. The bid was put together by Colin Rigo and Dawn Harris and the funding will be used to employ a specialist adviser on new technologies and to conduct a research project on heating innovation within the Construction Curriculum Area. Tony Ridgeway stated, "It's an outstanding opportunity to put sustainable construction at the College's heart."

Reduce carbon footprint: Shut down computers

A significant step has recently been made to reduce the College's carbon footprint by shutting down its computers at night time. After a study carried out by Andre Verwijs of the Sustainability Forum, the energy-saving "Night-watchman" software, funded through a grant from the LSC and Salix Energy Saving Programme, is now being tested for us by Dell. This software will allow computers on both the Staff and Learner Networks across all campuses to be shut down remotely after 9pm – so computers will no longer be left on overnight or over the weekend. As soon as this process is completed, it will be implemented at Leicester College by the Libraries and E-strategy team.

It is estimated that this improvement will allow for savings in excess of £50,000 on our yearly electricity charges. Special monitoring equipment, installed at SMC by Estates for the purpose of measuring the differences in usage, will be able to give an exact figure of the savings and the impact this will have on our carbon footprint.

This is another step towards the College's commitment to responsibly using its resources and becoming more sustainable.
